POETRY FOR THE SOUL

In his book 'A Splash of Words: Believing in Poetry', Mark Oakley says 'like throwing a pebble into water, a poem causes a splash of words whose ripples can transform the way we see the world, ourselves and God'. In this course we will look at poems from across traditions, cultures and centuries and consider what they can tell us about how to live, how to pray and how to understand our world

People turn to poetry at times of great joy and great sadness, at weddings and at funerals. Poetry has a lot to offer us in this time of uncertainty and change. This is a course for people who love poetry and for people who are afraid of poetry. Like ministry, poetry can say different things to different people and some of it may not speak to us immediately. Hearing the insights of others can open up a poem for us.

Participants will be invited to have open conversations and engage in creative activities to deepen their responses to the poems. We will also consider how the poems speak to and help us deepen our spiritual practice.

This course involves a time commitment of two to three hours per week including a weekly live webinar at 2pm every Wednesday. A recording will be made available for anyone who is unable to attend at that time.

BIBLE STUDY FOR QUAKERS

Do you find the Bible intimidating but intriguing? Do you want to engage your meeting in Bible study? This course will help you to find your way around the Bible and understand the distinctive Quaker approach to scripture. You will closely study several Biblical texts and reflect with others on your experience of the Bible. Each of the six units will be accompanied by a group study plan, supporting you in sharing your learning with your local Quaker community. Each unit contains video, audio and written materials to engage with, and forums to share reflections and ask questions.

Nurturing our Quaker Community

WORSHIP, MINISTRY AND AFTERWORD

How do we encourage quality and depth in Quaker worship and spoken ministry? Everyone in a Quaker community, and especially those with eldership responsibility, should consider this issue sometimes. Some things are simple, like encouraging people to arrive with hearts and minds prepared. Other things involve bigger changes: in my research on 'afterwords' in 2016. I found that lots of Quaker meetings had experimented with afterwords, joys and concerns, and other ways of making their worship time more fruitful and inclusive. In this workshop, we'll look at the process of attending meeting for worship: arriving, centring down, prayer, ministry, afterwords or other options, notices, social time, and leaving.

AN INTRODUCTION TO PEACE EDUCATION

£36

Woodbrooke and Quaker Peace and Social Witness Quakers in Britain working in partnership.

This introduction to the theory and practice of peace education draws upon the experience of Quaker Peace and Social Witness to explore how we can support the development of children's inner peace, help children to understand conflict and their relationship with it, and engage children with wider peace issues, from the ethics of armed drones to conscientious objection and human rights. We will endeavour to establish a supportive learning community and encourage reflective practice and peer learning and assessment.

ELDERSHIP AND OVERSIGHT

This six-week online course will help all those serving in eldership and oversight to gain better understanding and confidence in their role – whatever the system in their meeting. You should allow two to three hours a week for pursuing this course.

THE ROOTS OF THE QUAKER WAY

What are the roots of the Quaker way? How were early Friends influenced by their religious context? This online course will consider the connections between Quakers and other radical groups, such as the Beguines, the Rhineland Mystics, the Anabaptists, the Family of Love, and the Radical Puritans. We will look at how late medieval movements, the radical wing of the Reformation, and the English Revolution helped shape the religious culture out of which the Quaker movement emerged.

Exploring the Living Quaker Tradition

HEAVEN ON EARTH

£54

This course is based on seven live webinars run every Thursday at 15.00 (UK time) from 4 June to 16 July.

The Quaker movement began with an extraordinary confidence that the kingdom of heaven was arriving on earth. The living word of Christ was sounding among his people and transformation was at hand for those who heard and responded. Ideas that had become part of Christian doctrine such as the second coming and the expectation that God's righteousness would triumph in the affairs of the world were perceived as imminent realities. Friends felt they were living in the same Spirit as the early followers of Jesus and this brought vivid meaning to the teaching and stories of the New Testament. But just as change came for the first Christians, so Quakers had to adapt their thinking once the world did not transform in the 1650s. We will explore the new vision that animated both movements as well as how they responded when their expectations were not met. There will be plenty of input, a chance to hear the three course leaders in discussion each week as well as time to reflect on where this leaves the Quaker faith today. Is there meaning we can draw out of this central part of our faith tradition for the challenges of our lives today? What might heaven on earth mean for us now?

We will be factual and practical, but all we do will be underpinned by the spiritual question of what trusteeship means within Quakers? What does God require of us? What does the law require? What is considered good practice for charities? How does this fit with Quaker good practice? How do trustees, area and local meetings relate to each other? How can trustees best serve our meetings? This course is particularly suitable for new/ less experienced Area Meeting trustees. This course involves a time commitment of approximately two to three hours per week.

Bayard Rustin was one of the most important civil, human and labour rights activists.

African American and gay, his life's work was in standing up for marginalised people. He was an important influence on Martin Luther King, persuading him to adopt the principles of non-violent resistance in the struggle for civil rights. This online course will explore how he put his Quaker faith into action. A study of his writings and songs, as well as literature, film and art inspired by him, will allow us to approach his life from a variety of perspectives.

This self-paced course introduces a process of writing for authentic, creative self-expression and personal development. A "no red pens" approach results in greater awareness, mindfulness and self-acceptance through a gentle stream of guided tools you can use just five minutes at a time. The course includes six multimedia modules and a workbook, based on the work of Joanne Klassen, creator of Life Writing for Transformation™. Each module introduces key concepts from the book followed by exercises, examples, a review and additional optional learning activities.


EXPECTANT WAITING: REFLECTIONS FROM THE BIBLE AND QUAKERS, FROM THEOLOGY AND POETRY

Martin Layton is a Friend and teacher. His interest is in exploring how Quaker spirituality strengthens lives of active witness.


Martin Pennock is a linguist who, as an experienced clerk and elder at local, area and national levels, has always sought to leaven his respect for Quaker discipline with humour.
