How can we make the meeting a community in which each person is accepted and nurtured, and strangers are welcome? Seek to know one another in the things which are eternal, bear the burden of each other's failings and pray for one another. As we enter with tender sympathy into the joys and sorrows of each other's lives, ready to give help and to receive it, our meeting can be a channel for God's love and forgiveness.

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Welcome

Sawubona is a Zulu greeting from South Africa that means "I see you; you are important to me and I value you". Being aware of others' needs is important and helps us appreciate our communities. Talk with the children about a time they have been welcomed into a new community. Think of greetings that we use and maybe greetings from other countries they might know.

Story

Play

Bring the children together in a circle and ask them to perform actions that will reveal their similarities and differences. For example, ask those who like chocolate to hop on one leg, and then ask those who enjoy drawing to jump up and down, and then anyone who speaks another language to twirl around. After a few rounds, ask the children to discuss how they saw how they are similar and different from each other. Emphasize the importance of shared interests and unique differences, as they make each individual special.

Afternoon Tea



Getting to know each other is part of building community. We are all different and unique; spending time together enables us to get to know and appreciate each other. A tea party organised by the children is an opportunity to build community. They could also host the after meeting coffee with some homemade cakes.

Sing

Learn a simple song about getting to know each other. This version of The More We Get Together has sign language that you could also learn. This could be taught to others and shared at the tea party.

Create a set of circles for each person.



that increase in size. Begin with the smallest circle and ask the children to draw themselves in their home. Move on to the next circle and

have them draw their town, and so on until they draw the planet on the largest circle. Punch a hole at the top of each drawing and connect them with a ring. This easy craft will assist children in comprehending how they fit into larger communities.

Wondering Questions

Using the "Where am I" circles, ask the following questions:

- Where do you feel the most welcomed and included?
- What is it about those places that makes you feel this way?
- I wonder where you feel peaceful and at home?

Animals



The world is full of animals that live in groups. A group of elephants is called a parade, a group of goldfish is a troubling, flying geese are known as a team, a skein, or a wedge. But when they are flying close together in formation, they are a plump. There are some amazing collective nouns for animals – have fun finding them out!

As well as having interesting names, animal groups have different ways of behaving in groups that help them survive. Wildebeests live in enormous herds which makes it harder for predators to hunt them; all members of a meerkat family help care of the babies and migrating geese fly in a v-formation to conserve energy.
