Happy Birthday George!





In 2024, the Quaker community will celebrate the four-hundredth anniversary of George Fox's birth. To commemorate this occasion, the Quaker Arts Network, is inviting Quaker schools, summer camps, children's meetings, and other Quaker groups to create short films that showcase an aspect of George Fox's life and message. These films will be displayed on the Quaker Arts Network website and at events. The project will be ongoing from September 2023 until Yearly Meeting in 2024.

Can you imagine?

Do you think these women ever imagined they would be as brave as they turned out to be? And make such a difference? What about George Fox? Wonder with the children if *they* could do *anything* – what would it be?

One of the remarkable tales featured in *Herstory* is that of Harriet Tubman, a courageous fighter against slavery. Despite having been held captive in the fields, she managed to escape and later returned to assist others in their own escape. She bravely led numerous individuals to freedom and even served as a nurse on the battlefield during the Civil War.

Sing

Story

Discover the story of George's big discovery and how God reveals truth to us in the [FAITH & PLAY™](#) story. Faith & Play stories are for Friends to use as a vehicle for learning about Quaker faith and practice, and to explore our identity as Friends. Maybe try filming your version of George's story using props.

Make



Create a camera from scrap cardboard and make 'The Life of George Fox' as the film strip.

These could create a display on the Meeting House notice board. Have fun with this and interview members of the meeting, or neighbours and create their life stories on film strips. A great way to get to know each other. [This short tutorial](#) will show you how.

Play

All you need for a fun game is some coloured tape and some floor space. Gather some coloured tape and clear out a space on the floor at least two meters long.

Place the coloured tape in parallel lines on the floor, leaving enough space between them for a child to walk.

Assign a different task to each colour, such as hopping, skipping, or dancing.

Invite children to walk across the lines of tape, completing the task assigned to each colour as they go.

Encourage children to use their imaginations as they walk, pretending to balance on a tightrope or cross a treacherous bridge. They could imagine walking up Pendle Hill like George Fox - who, according to his diary, climbed it "with difficulty. It was so very steep and high".
